### Guided tour of the special exhibition »ZUGVÖGEL«

- 6:00 pm, 7:00 pm, 8:00 pm, 9:15 pm, 10:15 pm –

Birds produce the most striking sounds and have the most exciting colors, shapes, and abilities. In this tour, we explain why some of the museum's very old bird specimens are still on the move today, rather than resting in peace, as they continue to roam the halls of the museum.

### Here's looking at you, kid!

#### Guided tour of the arachnid collection

Six of these glass models have been undergoing restoration since May 2025. Glass restorer Bettina K. Schneider presents her work and shows what measures are necessary to preserve historical glass objects and what challenges can arise in the process.
