"Tell me where the women are..."

Women in Natural History Museums and Collections Network Launching Event

WOMNH is an international network which promotes interdisciplinary collaborations between researchers and museum professionals. It examines the roles women have played across the globe in the making of natural history collections and museums, highlighting their often overseen presence and (mostly) hidden labour in museums, in the field, or at home. In particular, WOMNH promotes the investigation of knowledge gaps that arise from overlooking women as museum employees, collectors, donors, and practitioners of science, leaving them as invisible agents in the construction of natural history. Beyond exploring the invisibility of women, WOMNH also examines women visible as dehumanised objects (or subjects) of scientific studies in connection to marginalisation or colonialism. By looking at how women have contributed – both voluntarily and involuntarily – to the collections and generated knowledge of natural history museums, WOMNH relates as well to contemporary discussions around social justice, participatory sciences and colonial structures in science.

Bio notes of presenters

Linda Andersson Burnett is a Wallenberg Academy Fellow and Associate Professor of History of Science and Ideas at Uppsala University in Sweden. Her research focuses on Scottish and Swedish Enlightenment studies as well as the role of natural-history travel and university teaching in state-building and colonial expansion in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries. Linda is currently the P.I. of the research programme Instructing Natural History: Nature, People, Empire at Uppsala University, which investigates the history of instructions in relation to colonial collecting and travelling. She is the co-P.I of the CNRS International Emerging Actions research project (WOMNH–19; 2024–2025) with Laurence Talairach.

Elena Canadelli is currently Associate Professor of History of Science at the University of Padua, where she is also Scientific Director of the Botanical Museum. Her research focuses on visual studies in science, science museum studies, and cultures of collecting natural history objects in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries. She has been President of the Italian Society for the History of Science and Editor-in-Chief at Nuncius. Journal of the Material and Visual History of Science since 2021.

Grace Ellis is a senior at Yale majoring in American Studies with a concentration in Public Humanities. Her research interests include Native American History, Critical Indigenous Studies, Settler Colonial Studies, the history of anthropology, and women's intellectual history. She interned for the Smithsonian American Women's History Museum at the National Anthropological Archives, where she developed her presentation "Storytelling and Silences."

Celia Emmelhainz manages the National Anthropological Archives in the National Museum of Natural History at the Smithsonian. Emmelhainz holds a master's in anthropology from Texas A&M, and a master's in library and information science from Kent State. Her recent research focuses on women's career choices in libraries, archives, and museums.

Paola Bernadette Di Lieto is a PhD student in Historical studies at the University of Padua and Ca' Foscari University of Venice. She collaborates with the Museo Galileo and the Museo Nazionale Scienza e Tecnologia Leonardo da Vinci. Her research focuses on the history of Italian scientific heritage, from the Unification of Italy to the twentieth century.

Sophia Gräfe is a cultural studies and media studies scholar working at the intersection of media studies and history of science. She is a Research Assistant at Humboldt-University Berlin as well as a Guest Researcher at the Naturkundemuseum Berlin, where she has initiated the editorial project "Images of Nature" together with art historian Julia Bärnighausen in 2020. Her research interests include Visual History of Science, Natural History Image Archives, Science Film, and Film & Animal Studies. In the current Winter Semester she teaches a class on "Women in the Natural Sciences" at HU Berlin.

Anita Hermannstädter is an historian, exhibition curator and cultural manager. Since 2012, she has been working at the Museum für Naturkunde Berlin as the co-founder and co-lead of the Centre for the Humanities of Nature department at the Museum für Naturkunde Berlin that addresses the political, societal and cultural dimension of a natural history museum.

Stefanie Jovanovic-Kruspel is an art & museum historian working at the NHM Vienna, where she is the curator of the "Hochstetter Collection Basel" – the bequest of the NHM Vienna's founding director Ferdinand von Hochstetter. Stefanie is especially interested in the

architectural histories of natural history museums of the 19th century and their role as media of science communications. Besides this her research focuses on the history of collections (especially entomology) and visualisation strategies of natural sciences in the 18th and 19th century.

Mary Margaret Lea recently graduated from the University of Virginia with a B.A. in Anthropology. She is an intern at the Betty Boyd Dettre Library and Research Center at the National Museum of Women in the Arts. Her research investigates how GLAM institutional practices shape women's roles.

Siobhan Leachman (0000-0002-5398-7721) is a Wikimedian and independent researcher actively involved in multiple Natural History related projects focusing on women. In 2018 she was awarded the Auckland War Memorial Museum Medal and is a Companion of the Auckland War Memorial Museum. In 2023 the Wikimedia Foundation named her Wikimedia Laureate.

Sarina Schirmer is part of the Center for the Humanities of Nature at the Museum für Naturkunde in Berlin and is currently completing her Master's degree in History at the Freie Universität of Berlin. Her interests lie in the fields of colonial collecting practices and environmental history, as well as the history of knowledge production.

Zoë M. Simmons's work in the Hope Entomological Collections has led to a specialism in historic collections research, particularly regarding identification of type material. She has an interest in the material culture of natural history collections, especially relating to insects and/or Victorian era collections such as the Octavius Pickard-Cambridge Exotic Araneae specimen collection and archive.

Laurence Talairach is a Professor of Victorian Literature at the University of Toulouse Jean Jaurès and an associate researcher at the Alexandre-Koyré Center for the History of Science and Technology. Her academic interests span medicine, natural history and British literature in the long nineteenth century. She is currently co-PI of a CNRS International Emerging Actions (IEA) research project (WOMNH–19; 2024–2025) with Linda Andersson Burnett.

Alix Veilhan – editor at the Muséum national d'histoire naturelle, in the General public editions. This department publishes exhibition catalogs, children's books, essays, as well as publications that showcase collections and scientific research.

Sabine von Mering (0000-0003-2982-7792) is a biologist and data scientist at the Museum für Naturkunde Berlin. Her work in the science programme 'Collection Future' focuses on linking collection data and knowledge contextualisation. She holds a PhD in botany and is an active Wikimedian. Her research interests include the history of natural history, especially of research expeditions, scientific contributions of marginalised groups with a focus on women botanists, and global networks of collection agents.

Hanna Wüste finished her Master's degree at the Humboldt-University of Berlin in July 2024. Between 2022 and 2024 she worked at the Center for the Humanities of Nature at the Museum für Naturkunde in Berlin. She will start her PhD thesis in the project "Killing to Keep: Violent Field Practices and Natural History in the Age of Empire" at the University of Basel in April 2025.
